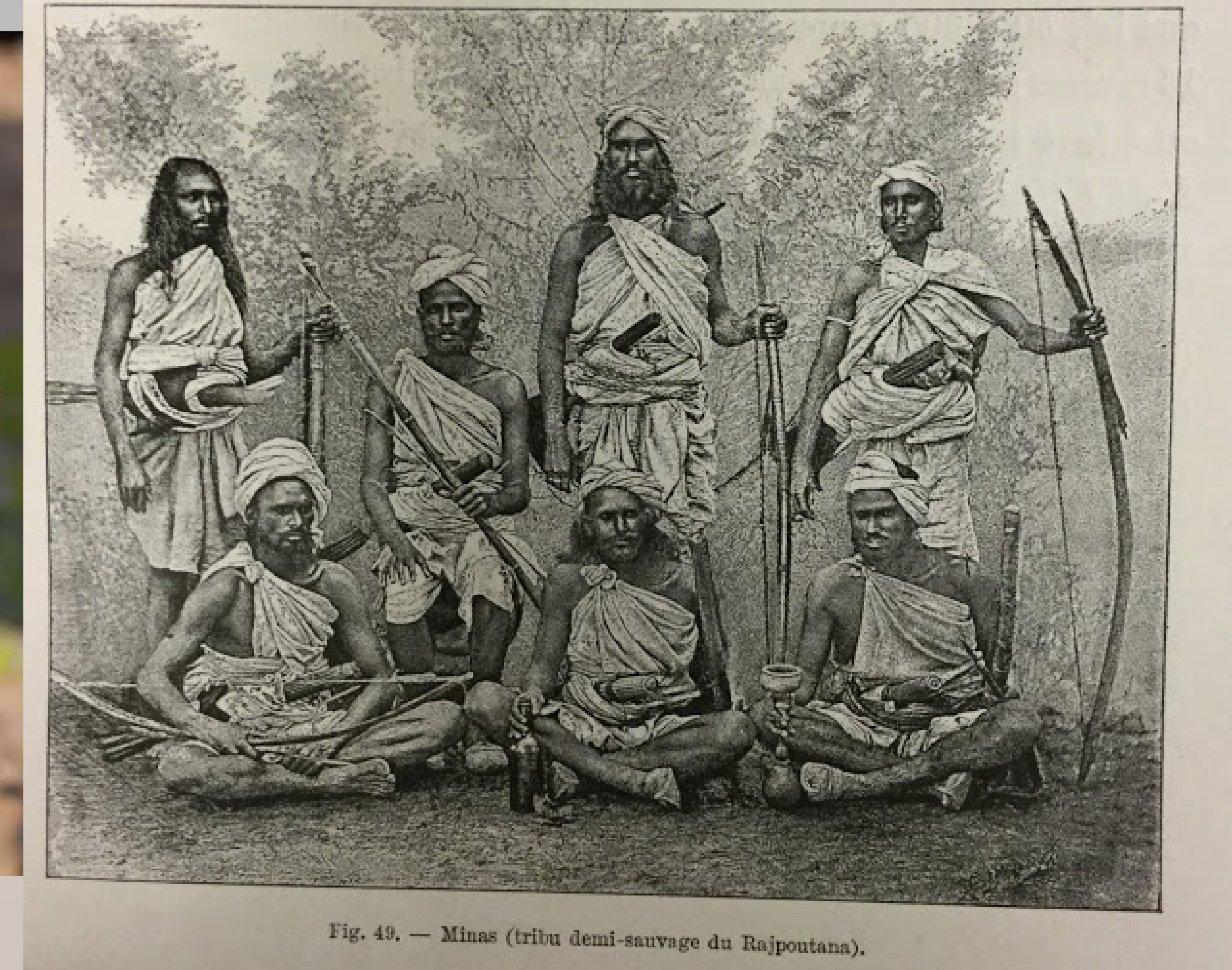


Fig. 49. — Minas (tribu desal-savages du Rajasthan).
